Women's History Month: A Brief History

Women's History Month is an annual declared month that highlights the contributions of women to events in history and contemporary society. It is celebrated during March in the United States, the United Kingdom, and Australia, corresponding with International Women's Day on March 8, and during October in Canada, corresponding with the celebration of Persons Day on October 18.

The commemoration began in 1978 as "Women's History day" in Sonoma County, California, and was championed by Gerda Lerner and the National Women's History Alliance to be recognized as a national week (1980) and then month (1987) in the United States, spreading internationally after that.

History

Women's History Week

In the United States, Women's History Month traces its beginnings back to the first International Women's Day in 1911. The holiday had been largely forgotten in the US until the late 1960s, when an activist calling herself Laura X organized a march in Berkeley, CA, on International Women's Day (March 8, 1969). The march led to the U.S. rediscovery of International Women's Day, and the creation of The Women's History Research Center, a central archive of the Women's movement from 1968 to 1974. Laura X thought it unfair for half the human race to have only one day a year and called for National Women's History Month to be built around International Women's Day.

In February 1980, President Jimmy Carter issued a presidential proclamation declaring the week

of March 8, 1980, as National Women's History Week. The proclamation stated, "From the first settlers who came to our shores, from the first American Indian families who befriended them, men and women have worked together to build this nation. Too often the women were and sometimes unsuna contributions went unnoticed. But the achievements. leadership, courage, strength and love of the women who built America was as vital as that of the men whose names we know so well. As



Dr. Gerda Lerner has noted, 'Women's History is Women's Right.' It is an essential and indispensable heritage from which we can draw pride, comfort, courage, and long-range vision. I ask my fellow Americans to recognize this heritage with appropriate activities during National Women's History Week, March 2–8, 1980. I urge libraries, schools, and community organizations to focus their observances on the leaders who struggled for equality —**Susan B. Anthony, Sojourner Truth, Lucy Stone, Lucretia Mott, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Harriet Tubman, and Alice Paul.** Understanding the true history of our country will help us to comprehend the need for full equality under the law for all our people. This goal can be achieved by ratifying the 27th Amendment to the United States Constitution, which states that 'Equality of Rights under the Law shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any state on account of sex.'" Carter was referring to the Equal Rights Amendment, which was never ratified, not to the amendment which did become the 27th Amendment to the United States Constitution after his presidency.

In 1981, responding to the growing popularity of Women's History Week, Sen. Orrin Hatch (R-Utah) and Rep Barbara Mikulski (D-Maryland) co-sponsored the first Joint Congressional Resolution proclaiming a Women's History Week. Congress passed their resolution as Pub. L. 97-28, which authorized and requested the President to proclaim the week beginning March 7, 1982, as "Women's History Week."




Dr. Robert Ellerston Shurney 1921–2007

Dr. Robert E. Shurney, an aerospace engineer at NASA renowned for achievements critical to the success of the Apollo and Skylab programs, was a deacon, community services leader, and longtime member of the Oakwood College church.

Early Years

Born on December 29, 1921 in Dublin, Georgia to Vance Shurney (1900-1991) and St. Clair (Clara) Weston Shurney (1901-1930), Robert was the third of four children. His father, a veteran of World War I, was employed in the Dublin Lumber Company sawmill. Following the death of their mother

Marriage, Family, and High Aspirations

Shurney married Susie Flynt (d. 1997), whom he met while a student at Oakwood, on May 16, 1946, two months after his discharge from the Army. They would have four children: Darrell, Glyndon, Glenn, and Ronald.⁴ The Shurneys lived in southern California for approximately three years. They then moved to Nashville, Tennessee, where Robert took a position as a maintenance engineer for Riverside Sanitarium and Hospital, an Adventist medical institution established to serve African Americans during the segregation era. While at Riverside, Shurney and his colleague Jonathan Walker led the hospital's maintenance staff in completing every phase of the construction of a new Adventist elementary school, except for the architectural plans. The school, intended primarily to provide Adventist education for the children of hospital employees, opened September 19, 1961.

theater during World War II.

Shurney's inventive gift became evident when he designed and installed a rotational surgical lamp for the hospital. Dr. Carl Dent, Riverside's medical director, urged him to complete his college degree. Having long desired to pursue higher education, Shurney resolved to do so despite warnings from others about the obstacles he would face as a middle-aged Black man and father of four children. He pushed forward, graduating in 1962 with a Bachelor of Science degree in engineering and physics from Tennessee State University.

Marian Rogers Croak is an American engineer known for her voice over IP (VoIP) related inventions. Croak worked for three decades at Bell Labs and AT&T where she filed over 200 patents and works at Google since 2014 where she is Vice President of Engineering, In 2022, she was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame for her work with VoIP.

Early life and education

Born May 14, 1955, Croak was raised in New York City. She credits her lifelong interest in technology to her father. While he did not have formal education beyond elementary school, he built her a chemistry set that set into motion an

early exploration of the sciences. Croak grew up entranced by the inner workings of plumbing, electricity, and other homerelated maintenance. Her career is defined by the desire to fix broken systems, just like the technicians she viewed as a child. She got a bachelor's degree from Princeton University in 1977 and a PhD from the University of Southern California in Social Psychology and Quantitative Analysis. Her education pointed her to the direction of Bell Labs where she worked for three decades.

Career

She started off in Bell's Human Factors division, with the specific purpose of studying how technology could be used to positively impact human's lives. Croak first began working on digital messaging applications, tasked with the study of determining if various messaging applications could communicate with each other. This kind of research was very novel, as the earliest form of the Internet would not come to full fruition until the next year in 1983. Bell Labs wanted to send voice, text, and video data digitally rather than using a standard phone line. The favored mechanism for this was Asynchronous Transfer Mode (ATM) protocol but Croak, along with the rest of her team, convinced AT&T to use TCP/IP instead. TCP/IP allowed for a standardized way of packaging and communicating information.

While at AT&T, Croak and her team contemplated the potential of digital telecommunications. She worked on advancing Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) technologies, converting voice data into digital signals that can be easily transmitted over the internet rather than using traditional phone lines. Her work has furthered the capabilities of audio and video conferencing.

At AT&T she patented the technology that allowed cellphone users to donate money to organizations using text messaging. She developed this technology during the aftermath of Hurricane Katrina, and it revolutionized how people donate to charitable organizations when a natural disaster occurs. She was inspired to do this after seeing AT&T develop technology that helped *American Idol* set up a voting system that relied on text messages rather than voice calls, in 2003. The technology that she created with co-inventor Hossein Eslambolchi, was not finalized until October 2005, a couple of months after Hurricane Katrina.

Bessie Blount-Griffin

In recognition of Women's History Month, I would like to write about an amazing woman who invented a device that would help disabled soldiers have the ability to eat. Her name was *Mrs. Bessie Blount-Griffin* and she was born on the 24th of November, 1914. The school she attended growing up was, Diggs Chapel Elementary School. The school was in Hickory Virginia, and it was a school specifically for black children. Her school didn't have textbooks until receiving them from white schools.

One day she was using her left hand to write and her teacher gave her a rap on the knuckles for that, because they believed that writing with the left hand was associated with wickedness. A rap on the knuckles meant that she got her knuckles hit as a punishment. She later became ambidextrous and could also write with her teeth and feet. The school she attended lost resources and she had to stop going to school when she had gotten to sixth grade.


Mrs. Griffin and her family moved to New Jersey, where she attainted her GED. While in New Jersey, she went through the Community Kennedy Memorial Hospital's nurse's program. She attained her nursing degree, and went to Panzer College of Physical Education and Hygiene, to become a physical therapist. She helped hurt soldiers during World War II; she then invented her feeding device in the 1940's. At first, the invention was a tube put into the person's mouth, and they would have to bite down on the tube to eat mouthfuls of food.

Mrs. Griffon later remade the invention and named it the "portable receptacle support." She acquired a patent for the device on April 24, 1951, but the U.S didn't want to purchase her invention. In the same year of 1951, she married Mr. Thomas Griffin and they later had a son named Philip.

The invention that was unwanted by the U.S. was instead sold in France and was put in their Military Hospitals. Around the same time, she invented the *emesis basin*, which was a kidney shaped container used to catch bodily fluids from a patient, and also to catch things for disposal. Just like her previous invention, the U.S. did not want to purchase the invention, so she sold her basin in Belgium. This invention is still used in Belgian hospitals today. Sadly, Mrs. Griffin passed away in New Jersey, on December 30, 2009 at 95 years of age.



Women's History Month

In 1987, after being petitioned by the National Women's History Project, Congress passed Pub. L. 100-9 which designated the month of March 1987 as Women's History Month. Between 1988 and 1994, Congress passed additional resolutions requesting and authorizing the President to proclaim March of each year as Women's History Month. Since 1988, U.S. presidents have issued annual proclamations designating the month of March as Women's History Month on occasion.

In March 2011, the Obama administration released a report, *Women in America: Indicators of Social and Economic Well-Being*, showing women's status in the U.S. in 2011 and how it had changed over time. This report was the first comprehensive federal report on women since the report produced by the Commission on the Status of Women in 1963.







NASA Aerospace Engineer

After his graduation, Shurney's application for an engineering position at NASA was initially turned down. His sister-in-law, an acquaintance of Dr. and Mrs. Martin Luther King, Jr., informed them about his plight and the Kings in turn informed Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy, who contacted NASA on Shurney's behalf, as did Congressman Adam Clayton Powell, Jr., of New York. After a favorable interview, NASA hired Shurney in the fall of 1962 as a flight Dr. Robert Ellerston Shurney Systems engineer at the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville,

Alabama. One of Shurney's first contributions at NASA was to work on the weight distribution of the massive Saturn V rocket. President John F. Kennedy's dream to send a man to the moon by the end of the 1960s was successful in part because of Robert Shurney's work. As test coordinator for flight operations, he directed crew training and research programs in aircraftbased weightlessness simulations to test human reactions. He spent 300-400 hours in weightless flight using NASA's modified KC-135 aircraft but, remarkably, never had to take motion sickness pills. One of



to his design.

Shurney's most notable contributions was designing wheels for the NASA lunar rover, or "moon buggy," that enabled Apollo 15, 16, and 17 astronauts to move easily across the moon's surface. His successful design, combining metal plates on the outside with mesh on the inside, made the wheels both strong and lightweight, giving the rover maximum traction while keeping the vehicle within weight specifications. He also helped design a solar shield to insulate spacecraft from the intense heat of the sun and a solar panel as a constant source of power.

Shurney's standout achievements also included developing ways for astronauts to perform essential human functions in a zero-gravity environment. He developed a binding agent to keep the astronauts' food from flying apart while they were trying to eat it and designed utensils and storage containers for the food. He also helped invent space toilets for the Skylab missions.

Continuous Education and Church Involvement

Shurney was relentless in his pursuit of education, and in the ever-changing world of NASA and space travel, such advancement was essential. "During my time as an aerospace engineer, I kept abreast of new innovations in space by attending many colleges and universities, including Meharry Medical College, Howard University, the University of Michigan, the University of Alabama and the University of Oklahoma," he stated. He also published several NASA Technical Memorandums and Papers on findings in microgravity research for leading scientific journals. A graduate again at the age of 64, Shurney completed his Ph.D. in physics from Columbia Pacific University, San Rafael, California, in 1986.

Throughout his years at NASA, Shurney's involvement in the Adventist church remained strong. He served as a deacon and held other offices in the Oakwood College church. He spoke at several Adventist colleges, including Andrews University where he lectured for Black History week in 1978. He was a vigorous fundraiser for Oakwood and active in the J. L. Moran Chapter of the Oakwood College Alumni Association. Continued on Page 32


After 28 years with NASA, Shurney retired in 1990. He and his wife Susie continued residing in Huntsville. They helped to establish the Adventist Community Services Center in the city. In fact, Shurney's daily routine in retirement, for several days out of the week, revolved around collection and distribution of food and other items donated for the center.

He remained active after Susie's death in 1997. They had been married 51 years. After a short illness, Robert E. Shurney died on November 25, 2007, at age 85.

Legacy

Robert Shurney's presence as an engineer with a leadership role challenged racial stereotypes at NASA, as seen in his initial meeting with Mercury astronauts soon after he was hired in 1962. "They said they were looking for the one in charge of weightlessness training," he recalled, "and they went to every white person in the room asking if they were the person who ran the program." To their surprise they finally discovered that, as Shurney put it, "It was my program." Astronaut James Lovell, in an essay about his early days in the space program, cited Shurney's work in discussing the contributions of Black people:

[M]any people I meet think the space program was the exclusive domain of white, middle-aged men with crew cuts. But the reality is that African Americans have played an active and important part in space exploration since the very beginnings of the program.



For his work, NASA awarded Shurney the Lunar Flight Award, Skylab Achievement Award, Apollo Achievement Award, and the NASA Exceptional Service Medal.

On April 7, 2021, Huntsville, Alabama, city officials held a ribbon-cutting ceremony to celebrate the opening of the Dr. Robert Shurney Legacy Center, an eleven-acre campus featuring the new North Huntsville Library and recreation facilities. The city of Huntsville, supported by donations from private and governmental sources, funded the \$11 million project. The center is named after Dr. Shurney in recognition of his "valued contributions" as "a NASA engineer and one of the most important leaders in manned space flight" and as "a trailblazer in the African American community."

Robert Shurney's achievements despite formidable obstacles showed what a strong faith combined with hard work can accomplish. As he put it, "Success is possible with clear goals, determination to succeed, and the blessings of God."

She received the 2013 Thomas Edison Patent Award for this technology. But through this technology after the 2010 Haiti earthquake, more than \$43 million in donations were collected by relief organizations through donations by text message.

At AT&T she managed over 2,000 engineers and computer scientists responsible for over 500 programs impacting AT&T's enterprise and consumer wireline and mobility

services. Her responsibilities ranged from product realization and service planning to development and testing. Before leaving AT&T she held the title of Senior Vice President of Applications and Services Infrastructure.

In 2014 she joined Google as a Vice President in the engineering group. At Google, she is responsible for expanding what the Internet is capable of doing around the world and increasing access to the Internet in the developing World. She created a new center of expertise on Responsible AI focusing on ethical development of AI within Google Research. Croak also works on racial justice efforts at Google and continues her goal of encouraging women and young girls in engineering.

Croak was inducted into the <u>National Inventors Hall of Fame</u> (NIHF), the <u>National Academy of Engineers</u>, and the <u>American Academy of Arts and Sciences</u> in 2022. Because of this, she became one of the first two black women to be inducted to the NIHF, joining the ranks of 48 other female inductees and 30 other Black inductees.

Patents

Croak has been awarded over 200 <u>patents</u>, almost half of which are in VoIP. Many of her inventions lay the foundations for the digital networks we know and use today. She was inducted into the National Inventors Hall of Fame in 2022 for her patent VoIP Technology <u>U.S. Patent</u> No. 7,599,359 *Method and apparatus for monitoring end-to-end performance in a network*. Today, the widespread use of VoIP technology is vital for remote work and conferencing, as well as personal communications.

She received a patent in 2005 for text-based donations to charity, along with co-inventor Hossein Eslambolchi, U.S. Patent 7,715,368 *Method and Apparatus for dynamically debiting a donation*. This technology enables a network to identify a particular charity, provide the designating funding to the charity, and then have the network service provider bill the original donor on its monthly bill.

Personal life

Croak won the Edison Patent Awards in 2013 and 2014. She is currently a member of the Corporate Advisory Board for the <u>Viterbi School of Engineering</u> at her alma mater, the University of Southern California. Croak is also a former board member for such organizations as the <u>Alliance for Telecommunications Industry Solutions</u> Catalyst; the Holocaust and Human Rights Museum (New Jersey); and the National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering. She has three grown children.
