

Ironclad Link Between Red Meat and Cancer Identified

The 'how' behind the link between red meat consumption and cancer has been identified

Researchers have discovered the mechanism linking the overconsumption of red meat with colorectal cancer, as well as identifying a means of interfering with the mechanism as a new treatment strategy for this kind of cancer.

Meat is a significant source of protein and fat, as well as essential vitamins and minerals like iron, zinc, and vitamins A and B. However, as is the case with many things, eating too much of it is bad for you. Despite the strong evidence

associating red meat with some cancers, the underlying mechanism is less clear.

Now, researchers from the National Cancer Center Singapore (NCCS), together with scientists from Singapore's Agency for Science, Technology and Research (A*STAR), have identified the



mechanism linking the excessive consumption of red meat to colorectal cancer.

Worldwide, colorectal cancer, which affects the large intestine or rectum, is the third most common cancer, accounting for around 10% of cancer cases. It's also the second leading cause of cancer-related deaths. In addition to age and family history, lifestyle factors such as diet, inactivity, obesity, smoking, and excess alcohol consumption can increase the risk of this type of cancer.

Using fresh colorectal cancer samples, the researchers discovered that the iron in red meat reactivated the enzyme telomerase via an iron-sensing protein called Pirin, which drove the progression of the cancer. Now, this requires stepping back to explain the importance of telomerase and telomeres and their relation to cancer growth. Telomeres, the little 'caps' found at the end of chromosomes, are made from DNA sequences and proteins and are required for cell division. With each cell division, the telomeres get shorter and shorter until they're so short that cells can no longer divide. When cells can no longer divide, tissues age. However, the enzyme telomerase can rebuild telomeres to restore cell division.

This might sound good, but if a cell keeps dividing uncontrollably, overcoming the natural limits imposed by telomeres, it can form a cancerous tumor. Because of all the division they do, cancer cells end up with critically short telomeres, which are too short to protect the chromosomes. To avoid inevitable death, the cells make telomerase so they can continue to divide and grow, effectively becoming immortal. So, to reiterate, the researchers found that the iron in red meat reactivated telomerase in colorectal cancer cells, thus driving the progression of the cancer. "We show how iron-(Fe³⁺) in collusion with genetic factors reactivates telomerase, providing a molecular mechanism for the association between iron overload and increased incidence of colorectal cancers," the researchers said.

In addition to pinpointing this mechanism, the researchers also identified a promising new treatment approach based on it. A small molecule called SP2509 was found to block telomerase reactivation in cancer cells by targeting Pirin, preventing iron from binding with it. In lab tests on cancer cell lines, SP2509 stopped the reactivation of telomerase and reduced tumor growth; it's a potential new treatment strategy for colorectal cancer.

"Understanding the role of iron in telomerase activation opens up new avenues for addressing colorectal cancer," said Professor Vinay Tergaonkar, from A*STAR's Institute of Molecular and Cell Biology (IMCB) and the study's senior author. "Our future research will focus on refining therapeutic strategies that target this mechanism, with the hope of developing more effective treatments for patients, particularly those with high iron levels. We are excited about the potential of small molecules like SP2509 to revolutionize cancer care and improve outcomes for patients globally."

The study was published in the journal *Cancer Discovery*.

The Order of the Palmetto is considered the highest civilian honor in the State of South Carolina. It was first awarded in 1971 by Governor John C. West. It recognizes a person's lifetime achievements and contributions to the State of South Carolina.

The award comes in the form of a certificate or plaque that, in part, reads: "In grateful recognition of your contributions and friendship to the State of South Carolina and her people. I do hereby confer upon John Bonsignor the Order of the Palmetto with all the rights and privileges appertaining thereto." Signed by S.C. Governor Henry Dargan McMaster.

Some of the more well-known people to have received an Order of the Palmetto are singer James Brown, author Pat Conroy, tap dancer Clayton "Peg Leg" Bates, and Civil Rights activist Septima Clark. In 1986, Governor Richard Riley awarded one to the "Unknown Confederate Soldier." A host of politicians have also been granted the honor — including several governors.


co-manager of the Latimer Funeral Home in Conway, SC. The funeral home is in the process of celebrating 100 years of providing funeral services to our community. George Latimer and his brother Marvin are now the managers of the Latimer Funeral Home since the passing of their mother in 2018. George H. Latimer, Sr. in 1924 established the Latimer Funeral Home. Shortly after completing an embalming school in Raleigh, North Carolina, Mr. Latimer moved to Conway. Mr. Latimer Jr. did share a newspaper article with us where his father had been interviewed and was published in 1973," Mr. Latimer Sr. indicated in that article that after moving to Conway, he went to work for Willie Goldfinch as an At the time there was not an apprentice. establishment to provide funeral services in Conway for Black people. Before the establishment of his funeral home, according to Mr. Latimer, the embalming of Blacks was done by Goldfinch Funeral Home. Mr. Latimer indicated that Mr. Goldfinch in the early years had a Black man work with him named Jeff Hemingway who later moved to Jackson, NC. In 1924, Mr. Latimer established the original funeral home at 1712 Racepath Street in Conway which later became the family home.

Mr. Latimer left Conway in 1927 and went to Dillon, South Carolina where he worked for two years at the Mary Reaves Funeral Home. In 1945, Mr. Willie Goldfinch sold Mr. Latimer the land where the funeral home now stands. Mr. Latimer indicated in the article that his first hearse was two horses pulling the hearse. In 1978 the current structure was built and since then some modifications have been completed.

With the death of the father, his wife, Edna Latimer took over the operation with the assistance of her two sons and others. Ms Latimer had been a businesswoman in North Carolina and clearly up to the task. After her passing in 2018, the two sons took over the operation. According to George, this was not his first choice of occupation and he initially explored other options but subsequently came back into the business. His brother, Marvin however, went to school and was always interested in running the business.

Beatrice Davidson Kenner and Mildred Davidson Austin-Smith

Today's article is about two black sisters that both enjoyed inventing, *Mary Beatrice Davidson Kenner and Mildred Davidson Austin-Smith*. Mrs. Kenner was born May 17, 1912, and her sister Mrs. Mildred Davidson Austin-Smith was born January 31, 1916, in Monroe, North Carolina. Their grandfather Mr. Robert Phromeberger was an inventor as well. He invented the three-color light signals for trains, and hospital stretchers. Their father, Mr. Sidney Nathaniel Davidson

patented a clothes presser and was also a preacher. The presser could fit into your suitcase.

The sisters were determined to help women everywhere, so their first patented invention was the sanitary napkin belt, which they started working on in the 1920's. Mrs. Kenner invented the moisture-resistant pocket for the belt. Sanitary napkins are what pads today are based off, it was a belt with a cotton pad in it (See page 26). At first, they did not have the money for the patent.

In 1931 Mrs. Kenner went to Dunbar High School in Washington, DC, and for college, Howard University. However, she dropped out after 18 months because she did not have enough money to complete college. She never received any degrees but was still an inventor. They finally gained a patent for the sanitary napkin in 1957. There was a company that showed interest in licensing their design, however they quickly reversed course after discovering that they were Black. Then once their patent expired, their design became public domain, and they never got paid for it.

Mrs. Kenner and Mrs. Smith also invented a toilet paper holder together, in the 1970's and both shared a patent for it. They received the patent on October 19, 1982. **Mrs. Smith** developed multiple sclerosis but during that time she invented a board game about family. She began working on the game in 1975. You had to place three cards that described the relationship between each family member like, "My cousin is my daughter's second cousin." She named her game "Family Treedition" and trademarked the name of her game in 1980. Her game was sold in multiple languages, even Braille. Mrs. Kenner holds the record for the greatest number of patents awarded a Black woman by the U.S. government. Mrs. Smith died in 1993 at the age of 77. Mrs. Kenner died on January 13, 2006, in Washington D.C. at 93 years of age.

Mr. Latimer Jr. talked about how hard the covid epidemic was for families and them as Funeral Directors.. Many customary things such as funerals in churches and other events where family gathered were not held. Although he indicated that they were extremely busy during this time conducting services, the numbers were not as numerous as in some of the northern states. When asked about some of the services that stood out, he indicated the Stackhouse funeral was probably one of the most noteworthy. Mr. Stackhouse had been an employee at the funeral home. He had always indicated he did not want to be buried lying down but instead sitting up. When Mr. Stackhouse passed, he was placed in a coffin sitting down shaped like a jukebox. This created national news, and an article and pictures were placed in Jet Magazine... Although he and his brother were born at that time, people in the community still talk about waiting in long lines to see the coffin.

Harriet Tubman Posthumously Named a General in Veterans Day Ceremony



After escaping slavery and helping others do the same, Tubman then channeled those experiences as a scout, spy and nurse for the Union Army during the Civil War, helping guide 150 Black soldiers on a gunboat raid in South Carolina. CHURCH CREEK, Md. — Revered abolitionist Harriet Tubman, who was the first woman to oversee an American military action during a time of war, was posthumously awarded the rank of general on Monday, November 11, 2024. Dozens gathered on Veterans Day at the Harriet Tubman Underground Railroad State Park in Maryland's Dorchester County for a formal ceremony making Tubman a one-star brigadier general in the state's National Guard. Gov. Wes Moore called the occasion not just a great day for Tubman's home state but for all of the U.S.

"Today, we celebrate a soldier and a person who earned the title of veteran," Moore said. "Today we celebrate one of the greatest authors of the American

Tubman escaped slavery herself in 1849 and settled in Philadelphia. Intent on helping others achieve freedom, she established the Underground Railroad network and led other enslaved Black women and men to freedom. She then channeled those experiences as a scout, spy and nurse for the Union Army during the Civil War, helping guide 150 Black soldiers on a gunboat raid in South Carolina.

Nobody would have judged Tubman had she chosen to remain in Philadelphia and coordinate abolitionist efforts from there, Moore said.

"She knew that in order to do the work, that meant that she had to go into the lion's den," Moore said. "She knew that leadership means you have to be willing to do what you are asking others to do." The reading of the official order was followed by a symbolic pinning ceremony with Tubman's great-great-great-grandniece, Tina Wyatt.

Wyatt hailed her aunt's legacy of tenacity, generosity and faith and agreed Veterans Day applied to her as much as any other service member.

> "Aunt Harriet was one of those veterans informally, she gave up any rights that she had obtained for herself to be able to fight for others," Wyatt said. "She is a selfless person."

Tubman's status as an icon of history has only been further elevated within the last few years. The city of Philadelphia chose a Black artist to make a 14foot bronze statue to go on display next year. In 2022, a Chicago elementary school was renamed for Tubman, replacing the previous namesake, who had

racist views. However, plans to put Tubman on the \$20 bill have continued to stall.




